
SYMPTOMS OF ANAPHYLAXIS



If you suspect anaphylaxis, administer epinephrine and call 911 immediately

in children and teens¹

Here are some things to watch for:

BRAIN

- Feeling of doom
- Confusion
- Agitation

FACE

- · Lip, face, or tongue swelling
- Trouble swallowing

BREATHING

- · Shortness of breath
- Wheezing or coughing
- Tight or hoarse throat

CIRCULATION

- Weak pulse
- Fainting or dizziness
- Changes in appearance (color) of skin, fingertips, or tongue

STOMACH

- Vomiting
- Diarrhea

SKIN

- Hives
 - raised bumps on darker skin; color changes may not be as obvious
 - raised red bumps on lighter skin
